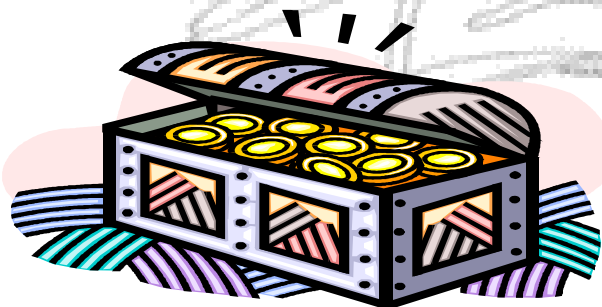

October 2008 AOS Classes

Dendrobiums Demystified (limit: 20 people) Instructor: Ron McHatton, PhD, director of education and regional operations, American Orchid Society Botanical Garden - Dendrobiums are found in a vast range of habitats throughout much of Southeast Asia. They are adapted to a wide variety of habitats, from cool, high altitudes of the Himalayas to lowland tropical forests and even to the dry climate of the Australian desert. Their hybrids are very often seen in the mass marketplace, but that does not make them easy to grow and flower. There are about seven or eight loose cultural groups, and this class will examine those that can be grown and flowered in South Florida.

A Simple Approach to Orchid Culture (limit: 20 people) Instructor: Madeline Michaelowski, orchid doctor, American Orchid Society Botanical Garden, Delray Beach, Florida Madeline, who is one of our very own orchid doctors, has been growing orchids for several years. This class offers the perfect opportunity for all new and experienced orchid enthusiasts to learn some fresh techniques on orchid growing and interesting information regarding orchid culture.

Diagnosing Orchid Pests and Diseases (limit: 20 people) Instructor: Russ Curtis, orchid doctor, American Orchid Society Botanical Garden, orchid grower for 25 years Pests and diseases that harm orchids – from bacterial rot to insects, such as mealybugs and scale – will be presented in this class. Students will discover how to identify the culprits as well as what to do to avoid them in the future. Students may bring in their ailing orchids for diagnosis; please place infected orchids in plastic bags to prevent contaminating other plants.

Orchid Potting Workshop (limit: 20 people) Instructor: Greg Allikas, chair of the AOS Publications Committee, professional photographer widely published in magazines and books, including World's Most Beautiful Orchids, West Palm Beach, Florida (www.orchidworks.com) If you've just received your first orchid or have been growing them for years, this class is for you. During this class, Greg will explain when and how to repot an orchid and will demonstrate skills to master this process as well as explain what supplies are necessary to make your repotting adventures a success. Students may bring one plant from home to repot during the class. Get hands-on help! Repotting materials will be available for a nominal fee.

Introduction to Angraecums (limit: 20 people) Instructor: Tom Kuligowski, avid orchid grower, specializes in Angraecums, award-winning photographer for 32 years, (tk_images@msn.com;www.artimages.us) Angraecums tend to be known for their beautiful, showy flowers that are fragrant at night. Some can even become fantastic specimen plants in just a couple of years. With both species and several sought after crosses, the angraecums offer some very unique shapes along with the most pristine white in any of the orchids. The amazing fact people aren't aware of is that they can thrive in South Florida's sub-tropical weather; if given the chance. This class will provide students with fundamental guidelines to grow these beauties successfully and in turn, grace you with years of enjoyment.

Beginners Start Here (limit: 20 people) Instructor: Sherwyn Klein, orchid doctor and garden tour guide, American Orchid Society Botanical Garden, Boynton Beach, Florida Newcomers to orchids will value their time spent with Sherwyn, who makes it easy to grasp the basics of orchid care. Discover how to choose plants, what plants need – water, light, fertilizer, temperatures – and how to grow them beautifully.

Gearing Up for Beginners – Supplies, Mounts and Media (limit: 20 people) Instructor: Sandi Jones and Tom Wells, co-owners of Broward Orchid Supply, Hollywood, Florida (www.browardorchidsupply.com) This class is all about gearing up with fundamental orchid supplies and the proper equipment to be able to grow orchids successfully. Learn the ropes from Sandi and Tom as they provide students with tips for beneficial tools, resources and gear from types of pots and media, to clips, hangers, benches, thermometers, sprayers, etc.

October in your Orchid Collection



October Climate Data

October is a month of change in South Florida. Usually around the middle of the month (perhaps later this year), the first strong cold front pushes into South Florida bringing to a close the monolithic heat and damp of summer and ushering in weather, as most of the continent knows it. Although reasonably warm temperatures will persist for another month or so until the technical end of the hurricane season, each successive cold front foreshadowed by ever lessening rainstorms will progressively cool our temperatures and dry our air.

Many of our orchids are well aware of this sea change. The shortening days of late summer have told many genera to finish their growth and prepare to rest. We need to listen too. Himalayan Dendrobiums of the Nobile type and of the section *Callista* (*D. aggregatum et al.*) now begin their five months of carefree existence. They should be put in a bright spot and given no more water (the occasional rain will sustain them) and above all, no more fertilizer until after they have bloomed in spring. Catasetums, Mormodes, Cycnoches, Calanthes and other deciduous types should be treated the same way. Whatever moisture nature provides will be adequate for these plants whose native environment is a seasonally monsoon one like ours. We must resist the temptation to nurture these genera. They will thrive on tough love.

Many Cattleyas, Laelias, Oncidium and Phalaenopsis-type Dendrobiums will be finishing their growths and should be hardened off with reduced water and fertilizer but not the Spartan regime of the deciduous type genera. Lower nitrogen fertilizer (Potassium Nitrate 13-0-44 is a good choice) and less frequent watering (every ten days without rain) will do for these. Be sure to let them dry 'hard' before watering. Lift the pot to be sure that it is substantially lighter or probe a bit below the surface of the medium to make sure its dry to the center. If you are certain they need water, then water them to the point of saturation and check to see that they feel heavy with the newly added water.

Monopodial orchids like Vandas and Phalaenopsis which want to grow continuously, feel the change too. The broad swing of day to night temperature stimulates flower spike initiation in these genera. You can spur them on to greater excitement by giving them a shot of high Phosphorus 'Bloom Booster' fertilizer just before or just after the sudden drop in night temperatures precipitated by the passing of a cold front. The high phosphorus seems to shock them into blooming. We like Miller's *Solugro* (12-48-8) because it contains none of the ugly blue flower, clothes and hand staining dye. Other brands (with or without dye) are equally effective. Look for a very high middle number and a relatively low first number or ask at your garden center for a 'starter solution' which is the moniker for these fertilizers when used in planting out vegetable or annual seedlings. Because the nitrogen level is lower, you can use a full tablespoon of these or more, per gallon.

October Con't....

Cooler weather calls our attention to our plants' needs for trace elements. Chief among these is magnesium, often described as the 'major' minor element. Magnesium deficiency shows up in orchids as a reddening of the foliage. This is frequently attributed to cold, but cold is merely the efficient cause: the material cause is lack of magnesium and potassium. Epsom salts (MgS) is the best and most readily available source of magnesium. This can be applied with Potassium Nitrate (KNO4) at the rate of one tablespoon each per gallon. A general-purpose trace element mixture can be added to the mix at the rate recommended on the label. (Concentrations vary). Goodbye red, Hello green! The new concepts of orchid nutrition based on the Michigan State university study recommend using lower nitrogen and higher magnesium and potassium all year, which should lessen the occurrence of this phenomenon in the first place. Motes Orchids will again be distributing Potassium nitrate at its Open House on Oct. 9 and 10.

Hopefully, following these recommendations you will have prepared your orchids for the cold and yourself for a house full of flowers for the holidays.

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Plan to Bring in Your Orchids

If you've been lucky enough to have a place outdoors to energize your orchids for the summer, now is the time to start thinking about bringing them back in. The plants will need to be checked for pests as well as groomed so that they look good when you bring them in. Your indoor growing area will need to be reclaimed and should be improved so that your plants will grow and bloom better.

As far as the plants themselves, you will want to take the time to clean them up so that when they come inside they're healthy and neat looking. One of the main things that you will want to do is make sure that there are no bugs or snails in the medium. If you have lots of time, put Diatomaceous Earth on the surface of your media. This will eventually kill the insects and snails, but it takes a week or so. Be sure to keep from inhaling the dust as you sprinkle it on.

Another thing that you can do is to fill a five gallon bucket, such as an old pickle bucket from a fast-food restaurant with water and put in about 1/2 cup of insecticidal soap or dish detergent. Holding your hand over the media, dunk the whole plant in the water and hold for about a minute. If there are any insects in the media, they will be killed by the soapy water. Drain well and then flush with plain water. Count this as one of your waterings.

Inside you will need to clear off the areas where your plants will winter. Be sure that all humidity trays are cleaned and placed properly. If you don't have any, I would recommend investing in some, depending upon how many plants you have. This is one of the best purchases you can make if you are serious about your plants and growing them inside.

If you're like me, you have recycled the space that the plants used to take up for something else during the summer months while they were outside. Take a new look at where you are putting them and try to make one improvement over what you had last year. Can you add a fan to the room? Do you need more or less lighting? Do you want to try a terrarium for those smaller plants? This is the time to think about and accomplish improvements while you have room to work.
